Directions

- 1. Start: Talk to students about rising above their hardships.
- **2.** Read: "Still I Rise" by Maya Angelou. Speak to the students about how that makes them feel.
- **3.** Discuss: the meaning behind "The Legend of the Phoenix". Tell the students what the Phoenix is and why it's important.
- **4.** Write: Have the participants fill in the blanks about positive self-talk. Have the participants share if time permits.
- **5.** Art: Coloring and decorating the Phoenix.
